#### **Entrance Procession**



At this part of the Mass, you say a prayer asking for forgiveness. While you are saying the prayer, ask forgiveness from God.






#### Gloria

The preface ends with the "Holy, holy, holy" for the adoration with angels and saints announcing his coming.






## **Eucharistic Prayer**








**Communion Rite**




